With the revision of the National Development Strategy, the NHBS data will play a critical role in monitoring government priorities and guiding macroeconomic plans. Moreover, with sustained stability, these statistics will strengthen confidence in South Sudan's potential, paving the way for both public and private investments.

Field work commences on Monday, July 22nd and runs through August 12th.
